The purpose of the course:

(1) To raise the students' Academic English proficiency to the level of a competent user (6.5 IELTS and higher).

(2) To develop the students' analytical reading and critical writing skills to the required standards of academics.

Course description:

The course is designed to help the students master their English language analytical reading skills and written and spoken expression with precision and accuracy that corresponds to the required international standards of academics.

The course requires regular practice in all four skills (listening, speaking, reading and writing) concentrating on teaching written and spoken expression that is precise and demonstrates higher level thinking skills.

Academic English has its own vocabulary and special characteristics that distinguish it from General or Professional English.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- use the writing process (planning, drafting, editing, revising) to clearly express and support an opinion in paragraphs and essays;
- write an extended essay using basic research;
- use APA references and citation style;
- recognize and understand selected academic words when seen in context;
- develop the micro skills of a competent reader, including skimming, scanning, note-taking, and guessing the meanings of unknown words;
- identify the topic, main idea/thesis, and argument structure when reading and listening;
- distinguish fact from opinion and recognize point of view in reading and listening passages;
- choose a note-taking strategy that enables him or her to best understand and remember lecture content.

The students are supposed to write a semester-long critical essay that comprises 5 main stages: I Identifying the topic for study and data collection

- Extensive critical readings followed by summary writing with citation
- II Making an outline of the essay and writing the Introduction
- **III** Drafting the main body of the essay
- IV Self-appraisal and Peer-review, editing the final draft
- **V** Presentation
